Update from Solace

Between July and September 2019, Bexley Solace Women’s Aid advocacy and support services (SASS) received 225 referrals into their service (this includes one male survivor) and 67 referrals into their group programme **ARISE**. This represents a significant increase in quarter 1 as the service is embedded into delivering support for victims of domestic abuse in Bexley. The two main referrers into the service remain as

ARISE is an 8-week domestic abuse awareness course designed to increase confidence and empower women to keep themselves safe. The sessions can help build confidence, self-esteem and improve


Solace, in partnership with London Borough of Bexley, provides a specialist domestic abuse for women and men aged 16 years and over who live in the borough and may be subject to physical, sexual, psychological or financial abuse and coercive control within an intimate or family relationship. Solace also provides safe and suitable refuge accommodation, advocacy for high risk cases and an outreach service for medium risk cases.

MARAC

Between January and December 2019, 356 cases were heard over 22 MARACs compared to 306 (over 20 MARACs) in 2018 which is showing a slight increase. The average number of cases discussed is 15 but this can vary considerably from one meeting to the next with December 2019 having 26 cases listed. In 2019 there were 79 repeat* cases discussed (59 in 2018) with a marked increase in the number of children within the household of victims of domestic abuse – 473 in 2019 and 341 in 2018.

A repeat case is ANY instance of **abuse between the same victim and perpetrator(s), within 12 months of the last referral to MARAC.*

The main source of referrals into Bexley MARAC is the police, followed by IDVA, Children’s Social Services and the voluntary sector.

How stalkers can spy on their partners



In October the BBC reported on an increase in the use of powerful software to spy on partners. Stalkerware, also known as spouseware, is a surveillance software programme which can be openly purchased on line. Deaf Health Charity launches SignHealth prevention videos
